Biographical Sketch

Clint Johnston is currently the President of the British Columbia Teachers Federation (BCTF) and a CTF/FCE Board member. He served five years on the CTF/FCE Executive as a VP. In that role he represented the CTF-FCE as needed, including at the El World Congress in July 2019 as head of the CTF/FCE delegation and the 2023 Congress as a delegate. These events add to experience and knowledge gained through BCTF international solidarity work – including building partnerships with the GUPT in Palestine, in Bolivia supporting teacher development, and throughout North America for the Tri-National Coalition in Defense of Public Education.



Clint is in his eighth year as a fully released BCTF officer – 2nd Vice-President, 1st Vice-President, and now President. He served three years as Local President in Chilliwack and has led bargaining teams both locally and provincially. The result of these experiences means Clint has good local, provincial, federal, and international understanding on a broad scope of union and governance issues.

Clint lives in Vancouver, British Columbia. His and Holly's five children attended public schools in British Columbia and undertook the French immersion program to enable them to communicate in both national languages fluently, and he is attending French classes with the same goal.
