Presently, Connie is a passionate classroom teacher in a K-12 school, a member of the CTF/FCE AGM work group, and trustee of the CTF/FCE Trust Fund. She is the Executive liaison to the Advisory Committee on the Status of Women and a 2024 CTF/FCE Women's Symposium organizing committee member. She is featured in the CTF/FCE resource, Fem Lead Fem guiding those identifying as women to pursue leadership within their teacher organization. The CTF/FCE podcast Source also highlighted her leadership journey this past year.



Locally, Connie spent six years as an NBTA/NBTF board member and two years as an NBTA/NBTF Executive member. She served three terms as president of her local branch and was a member of several NBTA committees, including co-chairing the provincial conference in 2014.
